

Introduction


Youth representatives from 21 Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) member economies assembled virtually during a series of meetings held in October and November 2021. The host economy, New Zealand, offered a unique opportunity to its rangatahi (young people) to be part of APEC by hosting an online domestic event alongside the traditional APEC Voices of the Future International event. The domestic meetings focused on APEC issues within the New Zealand context, supported by local speakers. This provided an opportunity for over 50 young people to korero (converse) with one another, tune into the international APEC Voices of the Future event and CEO Summit. Both of these opportunities ensured youth voices were front and centre, to deepen, strengthen and amplify both concerns and visions for a more inclusive and sustainable Aotearoa and wider region.

This year's Voices of the Future event was organised in partnership between APEC 2021 (Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade New Zealand), Auckland University of Technology (AUT) and APEC Voices New Zealand with an Alumni Working Group consisting of APEC Voices NZ representatives from previous years supporting the organising committee.



Key Highlights & Milestones


- Most inclusive APEC Voices of the Future event in history - due to the virtual nature of this years' event, all 21 APEC economies were present.
- Pre-summit drafting sessions, facilitated by APEC VoF NZ Alumni, were held to support the drafting of this year's Youth Declaration.
- APEC Voices of the Future International Event was live-streamed online to an international audience.
- In the first time in history, the APEC Voices of the Future 2021 Youth Declaration was handed over to the Chair of APEC: New Zealand Prime Minister, Jacinda Ardern.

Introductory Meeting - 13th October 2021

The 90 minute introductory meeting on October 13th 2021 kicked off the Voices of the Future programme for 2021, bringing together all delegates and educators. Delegates from each economy introduced themselves and their teams, also reflecting on the question "what matters most to young people in your economy as we recover from COVID19?". This created a window into the challenges and opportunities confronting youth across the region, the early stages of a shared understanding which was enhanced as we journeyed along the programme. An overview of the themes enabled participants to begin generating ideas for the declaration.

Drafting Sessions

To facilitate the drafting process, four drafting sessions were held to give all economies a chance to contribute to the content of the Youth Declaration. The Youth Declaration was to be presented to New Zealand Prime Minister and Chair of APEC 2021 Jacinda Ardern at the conclusion of the Voices of the Future International event in November. Each group was chaired by a New Zealand alumni of the Voices of the Future programme.

The four drafting sessions focused on one of the four themes of APEC Voices of the Future 2021:

- A Digital Future
- · International Cooperation to Combat Covid-19
- A Greener Future
- A Future for All

Each economy was assigned to one of these themes and was asked to present their delegation's ideas on the theme at the drafting session. Each economy nominated an economy spokesperson to present these ideas and also be involved in the subsequent drafting session on the 27th of October. These drafting sessions also featured thought provoking talks by guest speakers. Two economies per theme also nominated lead drafters, who were tasked with pulling together the ideas discussed in their drafting session and putting together the draft of the declaration.

A Digital Future - 20 October 2021

The Digital Future drafting session included guest speakers Connie Man Hei Siu (ITU Asia-Pacific Youth Envoy) and Dr Mahsa Mohaghegh (Director of Women in Technology at AUT and Al expert). Discussions took place around how the COVID-19 pandemic has accelerated digital transformation and highlighted that digital technologies are now essential for work, business and public services. However, there are many layers to the digital future that need to be adequately managed to make this a safe and equitable future. Economy speakers from Papua New Guinea, Peru, Singapore, Thailand and the United States all brought unique perspectives to the discussion. It was agreed that the digital economy is a vital aspect of economic growth, along with digital technologies having significant potential to advance social outcomes, such as financial inclusion, better healthcare, and increased sustainability. For this to become a reality, access to technology and digital literacy is critical. The discussions emphasised that cyber security and disinformation need to be better managed by the public and private sectors, and the need to prioritise wellbeing in the age of social media.

International Co-operation to Combat COVID-19

- 20 October 2021 The International Co-operation to Combat COVID 19 session included


many different lenses on how leaders, businesses, and civil society can work together to emerge from the pandemic in a better state. Guest speakers Vannary Kong (USA Delegate to the Youth G20 in Tokyo and Trade and Connectivity Sherpa at the Youth G7) and Nikita Kent (Prime Minister's Scholarship to Latin America recipient and intern at the United Nations) focused on how young people can mobilise and create the change they want to see. Other international youth platforms were emphasised, along with how we as youth can work collaboratively in an international capacity. It was also evident that in order to collaborate effectively to combat COVID-19, it is necessary that leaders and decision makers from around the globe collaborate. The importance of education and mental health were also emphasised. Economy speakers from Hong Kong, Japan, Malaysia, the Philippines and Viet Nam shared their perspectives on how we can not only combat COVID-19, but emerge from the pandemic more resilient, responsive and sustainable. A key point of discussion was the allocation of resources to ensure that we not only combat this pandemic, but to also ensure that we are not faced by the same challenges in the future.





A Greener Future - 21 October 2021

The Greener Future discussion really highlighted the urgency young people feel to combat climate change. This is, without doubt, the biggest challenge of our time. Guest speaker Siobhan O'Connor (Project Manager at Predator Free Hauraki) shared an insightful perspective, emphasizing interconnected nature around environmental challenges including how our fresh waters and biodiversity is impacted by human activity. Guest speaker Raeed Ali (youth environmental activist) shared his perspective on lived experiences around adaptation techniques to some of the environmental challenges currently facing Fiji. The greener future discussion highlighted a number of critical environmental issues facing different APEC economies, solutions to some of these challenges and importantly, the shared vision of collective action to achieve greener economies across our APEC region and a greener future together. We heard from economy speakers throughout Brunei, Chile, Canada, Mexico and Chinese Taipei, weaving their intercultural experiences perspectives to enrich the declaration.



Greener Future facilitator Courtney Davies speaks with guest presenter Raeed Ali of Fiji





A Future for All - 21 October 2021

The Future for All session was a highly engaging and immersive event, which was reflective of the diversity in the APEC region. Some participants emphasised indigenous groups, other ethnic minorities, and women. Guest speaker Shay Wright (indigenous social entrepreneur and APEC Voices of the Future alumnus) shared some of his research which included some alarming facts, yet gave us hope with practical actions. Guest speakers, Bianca Goebel and Taylor Hawkins, from the World Economic Forum in Australia, also shared their research offering insights from the Davos report. Finally, Economy speakers from Australia, China, Indonesia, Russia and New Zealand shared their ideas on creating 'a future for all'. What brought us all together was to ensure that youth have a genuine voice at the table, regardless of background. We agreed that as youth are the ones being affected by decisions made today, we should at minimum be consulted in these decisions.

Final Drafting - 27 October 2021

The final drafting session provided an opportunity for our international lead drafters, economy spokespeople and facilitators to work through the draft declaration. Drawing on the details outlined in the drafting session plans, each theme group explored the existing elements enabling economy spokespeople to provide feedback. Each group had a different way of achieving this - some already had a larger portion written whereas others used this session to add more depth. After 45 minutes of interactive dialogue, our lead drafters then reported back to the wider group to ensure a more cohesive document that would soon be the 2021 APEC Voices of the Future Youth Declaration. This enabled interdisciplinary collaboration between others involved in the declaration and encouraged a multicultural perspective.

2021 APEC Voices of the Future International Event



The APEC Voices of the Future International Event was a jam-packed two days, with many layers of conversations being built, and connections being made.

The event kicked off with an address by Dr Rebecca Fatima Sta Maria, the executive chair of APEC, who welcomed hearing ideas from the youth of the region. This keynote address was followed by sessions on International Cooperation to Combat Covid-19 and A Digital Future. Each of these sessions opened with an overview of the key points in the Youth Declaration for each theme, provided by the theme lead drafters. The International Cooperation to Combat Covid-19 featured Eduardo Pedrosa speeches from (Secretary-General of PECC) and Afiqah Ramizi (President of the New Zealand International Student Association). This was followed by an address from **Alvin Tan** (Minister of State for Culture from Singapore). The Digital Futures session featured an interview of Susan Wojcick (CEO of Youtube) by Sarah Chrisp (New Zealand Youtuber) and a presentation by Susan Chen (Director and Head of People at Riot Games). Day one was capped off by a keynote speech from Rachel Taulelei, the Chair of ABAC 2021.

Day 2 of the event started with keynote addresses by Jayathma Wickramanayake, the United Nations Secretary-General's Envoy on Youth, and Wayne Hay, International correspondent at Al Jazeera. This was followed by sessions on the Greener Future and Future for All themes, each following the same format as the previous day. The Greener Future theme featured guest speakers Kim DeRidder (Regional Director of The Asia Foundation's Environment Programme) and Juan José Guzmán (Advocate for human rights and the environment and founder of Pacto X El Clima). The following Future for All session guest speakers' were Edwina Pio (New Zealand's first Professor of Diversity at AUT) and Mayumi Sato (Gates Cambridge scholar and researcher for the UNEP@50 Report for the UN Environment Programme).

The <u>2021 APEC Youth Declaration</u> hand-over was perhaps the pinnacle of the Voices Event, signifying a genuine acknowledgement of youth voice within the APEC region. For the first time in it's 23-year history, the Declaration formed during the International Voices of the Future Programme was received by the Chair of the APEC Summit.

As an incubator of ideas, APEC enables regional economies to share a diverse range of perspectives on the foremost issues impacting the Asia-Pacific. This year's Youth Declaration sought to foster more of these ideas, contributing to Leaders' discussions in a practical and tangible manner.


The 2021 Declaration is unique in both tone and structure. Previously, APEC Youth Declarations have been created with the purpose of guiding potential discourse around the APEC region. This year, the Declaration called for measurable action, utilising targeted language towards APEC Leaders and an outcomes-focussed approach.

APEC Voices of the Future NZ Domestic Programme



New Zealand also hosted a domestic Voices of the Future programme, including delegates from each of New Zealand's eight universities, nominees from Te Puni Kōkiri and Te Rangitūpuku as well as the four delegates who attended the international event. While the event was intended to be in person, COVID lockdown restrictions forced the event to be moved online. The domestic delegates were able to watch the International event and attend the CEO Summit. In addition, there were sessions ranging from 20 minutes to an hour and a half run for the domestic event each day from the 8th to the 12th of November. Each of these sessions were hosted by New Zealand Alumni of APEC Voices of the Future.

The domestic programme started with an introductory session on Monday, which consisted of welcomes from The APEC New Zealand Voices Trust, AUT and APEC 2021 (Ministry of Foreign Affairs & Trade). Each delegation also provided an introduction. The delegates were then split into five groups for an icebreaker activity.

The Tuesday session started with an address from New Zealand **MP Arena Williams**, an APEC Voices of the Future Alumna. The delegates then split into four groups (one per theme) to discuss a few questions on their chosen theme. These groups were facilitated by the four delegates representing New Zealand at the International Event. Thoughts were then presented back to the whole group at the end of the session.

The Wednesday session featured a keynote address from **Stephen Jacobi**, the executive director of ABAC. This was followed by a panel discussion facilitated by **Dr Jessica Vredenburg**, Assistant Professor in Marketing at AUT. This panel included **Haylee Putaranui** (Global Head of Diversity and Inclusion at Fonterra), **Professor Jarrod Haar** (Professor of Human Resource Management at AUT) and **Kaye-Maree Dunn** (Director at Making Everything Achievable Limited).

The Thursday session featured an address by New Zealand's Minister for Youth, **Priyanca Radhakrishnan** and the Friday session wrapped up the event with a short speech from **Angus Fletcher** (Executive Chair of the Fletcher Trust), the presentation of certificates for our New Zealand delegates, the presentation of the June Gould Award and a reflective session, where the delegates split into small breakout rooms to chat about their thoughts on the event. The programme then wrapped up with closing comments from **Professor John Randal** (Associate Dean at Victoria University of Wellington) and **Derek McCormak** (Vice Chancellor of AUT).

Below are a couple of insights shared by NZ Delegates:

"The delegates of the Voices of the Future came together to discuss the various challenges faced by APEC economies. APEC Voices of the Future Alumni Involvement

Perspectives and involvement of APEC VoF as alumni has been quite pertinent especially with the pivot to online due to COVID. For a programme with such a strong and significant focus on young people, it was crucial to draw on the involvement and experience of previous VoF alumni as a steering group to ensure the focus remained on the success of the future generations

The Alumni Working Group (a sub committee of the APEC Voices of the Future Organising Committee) have played a unique and active role in the organisation of this year's APEC Voices of the Future event. The group led the drafting process for the Youth Declaration (including sourcing, interviewing and briefing each of the external speakers), facilitated all of the drafting sessions during the pre-summit for each team and throughout the planning process ensured that a youth perspective was front and centre. The alumni working group brought forward their unique experiences as previous APEC VoF delegates and provided valuable insight into the virtual drafting process which involved coordination between the approximately 124 delegates across 20 APEC economies and time zones.

These five alumni, **Tracy Han, Courtney Davies, Zachary George-Neich, Kiriana Koni** and **Hannah Pattullo** worked tirelessly and volunteered a collective 410 hours throughout the planning stage to bring this event with a youth flair to life (equating to watching the whole Lord of the Rings trilogy over 44 times!).

APEC CEO Summit

Across the two-days, delegates virtually attended the APEC CEO Summit where they heard, and learned from the world's most powerful CEOs, business leaders, entrepreneurs, thought leaders, Prime Ministers and presidents of APEC economies. Each topic throughout the day started and ended with a keynote speaker or address from an APEC Leader. Between sessions, engaging panel discussions provided deeper insights into the topics.

The first day started with a Pōwhiri, that set the scene for opening remarks from CEO Summit Chair, **Barbara Chapman** and APEC 2021 Chair, Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern. The first topic to ground the conversations in the CEO Summit was to understand the economic state of the world. Keynote speaker **Mathias Cormann**, OECD Secretary General highlighted some common trends that have been supporting and hindering the recovery of economies around the globe. He brought it back to seeing the opportunities further OCED and APEC partnership to make our recovery stronger, resilient, and consistent across regions.

Delegates then heard from business leaders from DHGate, Jacobs Engineering Group and Fonterra about their organisation's responses and recovery from COVID-19 and the transition to a more digital workspace was a common thread through this. A framing of the digital disruption uncovered what opportunities this brought to trade and a reminder of ESG within a digital future. Panels discussed how a sustainable future could look and the role of investment in renewable sources of energy including solar and green hydrogen. Keynote, **Dr David Suzuki** a broadcaster, scientist and author mentioned the importance of taking more bold climate action to respect and remain within ecological boundaries. **Amal Clooney**, International Human Rights Lawyer, was one of the standout keynotes for the day, really highlighting that, in today's world, businesses must pay attention to issues concerning human rights.

Day two brought the topic of Environment, Social Governance (ESG) to the forefront. **Richard Edelman**, CEO of Edelman gave an interesting keynote to start the day, talking about 'The Primary of Trust'. As basic as trust could sound, it dove deep into the complexities of it from consumer behaviours to the trust of employees being the foundation of a successful organisation. Panel topics included conversations around how businesses can be a force for good and the importance of indigenous peoples and youth to be at the centre as we look to the future.



In APEC CEO Summit tradition, the closing was a handover from CEO Summit Chair, **Barbara Chapman** to Thailand APEC CEO Summit Chair, **Dr Po.** Barbara wishes with optimism that the next CEO Summit could possibly be in person and emphasises that a successful 'fit for the future' recovery will need to be an intersection of a social-centred, people-centred and planet centred recovery.

The APEC CEO Summit has clearly provided the opportunity to learn, to be inspired, to connect digitally and to provide a platform for young people's voices to be heard. This is only the start of the journey, so much more can be done to elevate young people's voices within forums such as the CEO Summit.



The names of the 2021 recipients of the June Mayne Gould Leadership Award will be recorded on a special commemorative plaque placed at the APEC Voices Secretariat, which is based at the National Youth Achievement Award Council of Singapore and are invited to act as advisors to the following year's APEC Voices programme, in Thailand 2022.
